Living on the Vine: Scott Hahn Reflects on the Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time: In today's Gospel Jesus returns to the Old Testament symbol of the vineyard to teach about Israel, the Church, and the kingdom of God. And the symbolism of today's First Reading and Psalm is readily understood. God is the owner, and the house of Israel is the vineyard. A cherished vine, Israel was plucked from Egypt and transplanted in a fertile land specially spaded and prepared by God, hedged about by the city walls of Jerusalem, watched over by the towering Temple. But the vineyard produced no good grapes for the wine, a symbol for the holy lives God wanted for His people. So God allowed His vineyard to be overrun by foreign invaders, as Isaiah foresees in the First Reading. Jesus picks up the story where Isaiah leaves off, even using Isaiah's words to describe the vineyard's wine press, hedge, and watchtower. Israel's religious leaders, the tenants in His parable, have learned nothing from Isaiah or Israel's past. Instead of producing good fruits, they've killed the owner's servants, the prophets sent to gather the harvest of faithful souls. In a dark foreshadowing of His own crucifixion outside Jerusalem, Jesus says the tenants' final outrage will be to seize the owner's son and to kill him outside the vineyard walls. For this, the vineyard, which Jesus calls the kingdom of God, will be taken away and given to new tenants—the leaders of the Church, who will produce its fruit. We are each a vine in the Lord's vineyard, grafted onto the true vine of Christ (see John 15:1–8), called to bear fruits of the righteousness in Him (see Philippians 1:11) and to be the "first fruits" of a new creation (see James 1:18). We need to take care that we don't let ourselves be overgrown with the thorns and briars of worldly anxiety. As today's Epistle advises, we need to fill our hearts and minds with noble intentions and virtuous deeds, rejoicing always that the Lord is nearby.

Becoming Intentional Disciples – Fr Raniero Cantalamessa once said: "If we want to evangelize a secularized world, there is a choice to make. Where do we begin? The immense wealth of doctrine and institutions can become a handicap if we are trying to present all of that to a person who has lost all contact with the Church and no longer knows who Jesus is. It is necessary to help this person establish a relationship with Jesus. We need to do what Peter did on the day of Pentecost, when 3,000 people were present: to speak about Jesus whom we have crucified and whom God has raised and to bring that person to the point that he or she, cut to the heart, asks, "Brethren, what shall we do?" (Acts 2:37). We will respond as Peter does, "Repent, and be baptized every one of you" (Acts 2:38) if you have not been baptized, or if you have already been baptized, go to confession. Those who respond to the proclamation will join themselves - today as in that day- to the community of believers. They will listen to the teaching of the Apostles and will partake in the breaking of the bread. Depending on each person's calling and response, little by little they will be able to make the immense heritage arising from the kerygma their own. Jesus is not accepted on the word of the Church, but the Church is accepted on the word of Jesus." Our primary task when someone has reached the threshold of seeking is to help him or her focus on the person of Jesus and the central challenges of the kerygma. But this not just a "me and Jesus" mindset. Jesus is encountered in the context of the Church and of one's own parish. Crossing the threshold of seeking and intentional discipleship means actively wrestling with and seriously contemplating the following of Christ. When an individual crosses the line into active seeking, things really start to change. When large numbers of parishioners are actively seeking or are disciples, the spiritual atmosphere in the parish heats up dramatically. To enter into the threshold of seeking requires a certainty that a personal relationship with God is possible. Seeking feels like a quest. The seeker seeks Jesus Christ and not just God in a general sense or as the "divine", an "impersonal force", or a "Higher Power". Seeking is centred on the possibility of committing oneself to follow Jesus as his disciple. Seekers realize that following Christ has personal implications: It will make real demands on their priorities, time, money, relationships, and all other areas of life. They grasp the fact that discipleship is not just "fire insurance", nor is it mere "mental assent" to a few religious ideas or values. A person reaches the moment where - with complete freedom - he or she chooses to become a real follower of Christ. Let's pray that all of us may fully commit ourselves to fostering a deep, personal relationship with Jesus and follow Him.
