April 21, 2024 – FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Fourth Sunday of Easter: Scott Hahn Reflects on the Sunday Mass Readings – Jesus, in today's Gospel, says that He is the good shepherd the prophets had promised to Israel. He is the shepherd–prince, the new David—who frees people from bondage to sin and gathers them into one flock, the Church, under a new covenant, made in His blood (see <u>Ezekiel 34:10–13</u>, 23–31). His flock includes other sheep, He says, far more than the dispersed children of Israel (see <u>Isaiah 56:8</u>; John 11:52). And He gave His Church the mission of shepherding all peoples to the Father. In today's First Reading, we see the beginnings of that mission in the testimony of Peter, whom the Lord appointed shepherd of His Church (see John 21:15–17). Peter tells Israel's leaders that the Psalm we sing today is a prophecy of their rejection and crucifixion of Christ. He tells the "builders" of Israel's temple that God has made the stone they rejected the cornerstone of a new spiritual temple, the Church (see <u>Mark 12:10–13</u>; <u>1 Peter 2:4–7</u>). Through the ministry of the Church, the shepherd still speaks (see <u>Luke 10:16</u>), and forgives sins (see John 20:23), and makes His body and blood present, that all may know Him in the breaking of the bread (see <u>Luke 24:35</u>). It is a mission that will continue until all the world is one flock under the one shepherd. In laying down His life and taking it up again, Jesus made it possible for us to know God as He did—as sons and daughters of the Father who loves us. As we hear in today's Epistel, He calls us His children, as He called Israel His son when He led them out of Egypt and made His covenant with them (see <u>Exodus 4:22–23</u>; <u>Revelation 21:7</u>). Today, let us listen for His voice as He speaks to us in the Scriptures, and yow again to be more faithful followers. And let us give thanks for the blessings He bestows from His altar.

World Day of Prayer for Vocations – On the 4th Sunday of Easter, also known as Good Shepherd Sunday, each year we pray for vocations to all states of life and ministry in the Church, but especially for Vocations to the Sacred Priesthood and consecrated life. The word "vocation" derives its meaning from the Latin root vocare, which means "to call." In the Catholic Church, your "vocation" refers to God's call for you and your life. Jesus calls all of us in a unique and intimate way to know Him, love Him, follow Him, and serve Him. God has placed on each one of our hearts the desire for fulfilment, which is a desire for deep and authentic happiness. This desire is ultimately fulfilled in a relationship with God in Jesus Christ. True happiness is found in Christ – in our relationship with Him, in His will for us, and in a life given completely to Him. A vocation, then, is our path to perfect happiness, a journey by which God draws us closer to Himself through a life of holiness. Your vocation truly is a *calling*. This means that it does not come from the world, nor from ourselves. Rather, a vocation is an invitation from Jesus Christ to follow Him. The most fundamental and primary vocation of all people is the call to holiness. Holiness is not the luxury of a few, but the simple duty of all. We all are called to be holy - to know, love, follow, and serve God with our entire being. We all are called to live a life of virtue and to make a gift of ourselves to our neighbour in sacrificial love. We all are called to an intimate relationship with Christ through the sacraments and a life of prayer. The call to holiness touches us in the very depths of who we are. It is the reason for which we were created. It is the meaning of life! God – who is all Goodness, Truth, and Beauty - created us for Himself. He is the fulfilment of the deepest and truest desires of our heart. In the depths of our heart, we realize that God loves us infinitely; so much so that His love gives us our very identity. We are as His beloved sons and daughters. This is the lofty calling that all people share. All baptized men and women are called to become saints. We call this the "Universal Call to Holiness," and it is a life-long pilgrimage. We all are sinners in need of God's mercy. Only through God's grace and mercy are we able to persevere in this life of holiness. Jesus Christ, in and through the Church, invites individuals to a unique life of holiness by means of their *particular* vocation. Particular vocations refer to the unique state in life by which men and women are called to live out the universal call to holiness. There are four particular vocations: Married Life; Diocesan Priesthood; Religious Life; Consecrated Virginity. Our particular vocation is the way that we are uniquely called to respond to the universal call to holiness. Each particular vocation is a way of following Christ, growing in holiness, and serving the Church and the world. It is our path to greatest holiness, and therefore to our greatest happiness: life in Christ. Jesus Christ is calling many men to freely give of themselves and lay down their lives in service to the Church and the world as priests. Discovering God's particular calling for our lives takes time. We must spend much time in prayer and silence, listening for God's voice. Hearing this vocational call takes patience, perseverance, and trust in the Father's will. This process of hearing God's call for your life with the help of the Holy Spirit is called "discernment."
