## February 4, 2024 - FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Raised to Serve: Scott Hahn Reflects on the Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time – His lament reminds us of the curse of toil and death placed upon Adam following his original sin (see Genesis 3:17–19). Men and women are like slaves seeking shade, unable to find rest. Their lives are like the wind that comes and goes. But, as we sing in today's Psalm, He who created the stars promised to heal the broken-hearted and gather those lost in exile from Him (see Isaiah 11:12; 61:1). We see this promise fulfilled in today's Gospel. Simon's mother-in-law is like Job's toiling, hopeless humanity. She is laid low by affliction but too weak to save herself. But as God promised to take His chosen people by the hand (see Isaiah 42:6), Jesus grasps her by the hand and helps her up. The word translated "help" is actually Greek for "raising up." The same verb is used when Jesus commands a dead girl to arise (see Mark 5:41–42). It's used again to describe His own resurrection (see Mark 14:28; 16:7). What Jesus has done for Simon's mother-in-law, He has done for all humanity—raised all of us who lay dead through our sins (see Ephesians 2:5). Notice all the words of totality and completeness in the Gospel. The whole town gathers; all the sick are brought to Him. He drives out demons in the whole of Galilee. Everyone is looking for Christ. We too have found Him. By our baptism, He healed and raised us to live in His presence (see Hosea 6:1–2). Like Simon's mother-in-law, there is only one way we can thank Him for the new life He has given us. We must rise to serve Him and His gospel. Our lives must be our thanksgiving, as Paul describes in today's Epistle. We must tell everyone the good news, the purpose for which Jesus has come—those others, too, may have a share in this salvation.

Preparing for the Holy Year 2025 – Bishop Philip Egan writes: "As we embark on the new year 2024, the Holy Father has invited us to prepare for the Jubilee Year of 2025, entitled 'Pilgrims of Hope'. In his letter promoting the Jubilee Year, Pope Francis recalls the suffering and hardships that many of us experienced during the pandemic. In a time where many countries also suffer the effects of war and the climate crisis, Pope Francis sees the Jubilee Year 2025 as an opportunity to restore hope, a time of renewal and rebirth. The Jubilee Year will begin on 24th December 2024, with the opening of the Holy Door at St Peter's Basilica and will draw to a close on the feast of Epiphany, January 2026. In preparation for the Jubilee Year, the Pope has proclaimed this year 2024 to be a year of prayer in preparation. It will focus on that prayer given to the disciples, the 'Our Father.' The Our Father not only reminds us that God is our Father but also reminds us of the union we share as brothers and sisters in Christ. During this coming year of prayer, let us also (re)consider the Spiritual Works of Mercy. Just as Jesus was attentive to the practical needs of those He encountered in His ministry, the spiritual works of mercy call us to reach out to our neighbour and attend to their spiritual needs too. The seven-spiritual works of

mercy are: counselling the doubtful, instructing the ignorant, admonishing the sinner, comforting the sorrowful, forgiving injuries, bearing wrongs patiently, and praying for the living and the dead. In the parable of the sheep and goats, Jesus commends the ones who show mercy to those who are suffering and marginalised (Matthew 25:31–46.) Mercy is a virtue in which one is called to have compassion for another, and if possible, to alleviate their suffering. At a time when the Church focuses on forgiveness and reconciliation, the spiritual (and corporal) works of mercy are about helping those on the journey of faith and those who are searching to be reconciled with God, the Church and with others. So, as we begin this year of prayer in preparation for the Holy Year 2025, let us daily contemplate the 'Our Father' and extend that prayer in practice through performing the seven-spiritual works of mercy.

Catholic Faith Formation – Since October last year, a group has been meeting fortnightly on Monday evening at St Boniface to explore the teachings, beliefs, and practices of the Catholic Faith. The programme is called RCIA: Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults and is open to anyone who desires to be received into Full Communion with the Catholic Church. The programme is open to people who have not been baptised and to Christians of other denominations who now wish to join the Catholic Church. The programme is also very helpful to Catholics who may have been away from the church for some time and now wish to come back to practise their faith. Now those who are coming since October last year are now being asked to decide whether they wish to go further in their Journey of Faith and be received into the Catholic Church at the forthcoming Easter vigil, this year. Please keep them in your prayers. We have potential six individuals who are seriously considering making this step, so your prayers will be most timely. Thank you.

**Ten-Year Mission Plan** – As announced last year, Bishop Philip Egan has initiated a Ten-Year Mission Plan to bring our central focus back to Jesus, putting Him at the centre of everything we are and do. True renewal and growth are not simply the fruit of organising meetings and forging plans. It is first and foremost the fruit of being very close to the Lord. At the Last Supper Jesus used the image of the vine and the branches: "Abide in Me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine; you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing" (John 15:4-5). Those are some powerful words! Apart from the Lord we can do nothing. But with Him nothing is impossible. This is why Bishop Philip Egan urges us to deeply renew our prayer life and our sacramental life. Without prayer and the Sacraments, which are the channels God Himself has given us so that we may abide in Him and He in us, not even the best of plans can bear fruit. The six holy habits, which our Bishop strongly recommends, are simply an invitation to renew our prayer life and sacramental life. Representatives from the six parishes of our pastoral area have been working hard on consolidating our efforts around three key areas identified by the Bishop – 1) becoming a more Christ centred Church (through prayer, liturgy, and ongoing faith formation); 2) becoming a missionary Church (through outreach and evangelisation); 3) becoming prudent stewards of Christ's Church (through wise administration). Please continue to keep this intention in your prayers.
