

March 24, 2024 – PALM SUNDAY of the Passion of the Lord

Darkness at Noon: Scott Hahn Reflects on Passion Sunday – Crowned with thorns, our Lord is lifted up on the Cross, where He dies as "King of the Jews." Notice how many times He is called "king" in today's Gospel—mostly in scorn and mockery. As we hear the long accounts of His Passion, at every turn we must remind ourselves—He suffered this cruel and unusual violence for us. He is the Suffering Servant foretold by Isaiah in today's First Reading. He reenacts the agony described in today's Psalm, and even dies with the first words of that Psalm on His lips (see Psalm 22:1). Listen carefully for the echoes of this Psalm throughout today's Gospel—as Jesus is beaten, His hands and feet are pierced; as His enemies gamble for His clothes, wagging their heads, mocking His faith in God's love, His faith that God will deliver Him. Are we that much different from our Lord's tormenters? Often, don't we deny that He is King, refusing to obey His only commands that we love Him and one another? Don't we render Him mock tribute, pay Him lip service with our half-hearted devotions? In the dark noon of Calvary, the veil in Jerusalem's temple was torn. It was a sign that by His death Jesus destroyed forever the barrier separating us from the presence of God. He was God and yet humbled Himself to come among us, we're reminded in today's Epistle. And despite our repeated failures, our frailty, Jesus still humbles Himself to come to us, offering us His body and blood in the Eucharist. His enemies never understood: His kingship isn't of this world (see John 18:36). He wants to write His law, His rule of life on our hearts and minds. As we enter Holy Week, let us once more resolve to give Him dominion in our lives. Let us take up the cross He gives to us—and confess with all our hearts, minds, and strength that truly this is the Son of God.

What is 'Tenebrae'? The word means 'darkness'. On **Wednesday 27 March, at 8pm**, we will once again be celebrating the service of Tenebrae. This ancient service, which was reintroduced into our parish by Fr David Sillince, makes powerful use of the symbolism of light and darkness through a series of hymns, readings, psalms, and responses. The church is unlit, apart from the individual candles held by the congregation. 15 candles will also be burning on a triangular stand on the altar, and as the service advances, they are gradually extinguished one by one, as a clear visual representation of the growing dark as Christ's Passion draws near. At the end, only the single light of Christ remains as a symbol of abiding hope. This is an intimate and powerful service, held only once a year. All are welcome.

Maundy Thursday 28 March: Washing of Feet: Fr Tom invites 12 members of the congregation to take part in this beautiful ceremony, which will take place during the 7:30pm Mass. As Jesus washed His disciples' feet, so in modern times priests still perform this traditional act as an example of humility and service to others. **Twelve volunteers are needed.** Please sign the sheet in the church porch.

Why Do We Cover the Crucifixes and Statues During the Final Week of Lent? The Church recommends this practice to heighten our senses and build within us a longing for Easter Sunday. But why go through such lengths to cover up images that are designed to raise our hearts and minds toward heaven? First, we use veils to alert us of the special time that we are in. When we walk into church and notice everything is covered, we immediately know that something is different. These last two weeks of Lent are meant to be a time of immediate preparation for the Sacred Triduum and these veils are a forceful reminder to get ready. Secondly, the veils focus our attention on the words being said at Mass. When we listen to the Passion narrative, our senses are allowed to focus on the striking words from the Gospel and truly enter the scene. Third, the Church uses veils to produce a heightened sense of anticipation for Easter Sunday. This is further actualized when you attend daily Mass and see the veils each day. You don't want them to be there because they are hiding some very beautiful images. And therein lies the whole point: the veils are not meant to be there forever. The images need to be unveiled; it is unnatural for them to be covered. The unveiling before the Easter Vigil is a great reminder of our own life on earth. We live in a "veiled" world, in exile from our true home. It is only through salvation that the veil is lifted, and we are finally able to see the beauty of everything in our lives. This tradition that should not only be carried out in our local parish but can also be a fruitful activity for the "domestic church" to practice. Families are also encouraged to imitate this practice and veil prominent religious images in their homes. It is also a beautiful tradition to pass down to our children, who will be intrigued by it, and it will make this time of year truly special for them. We go through great lengths to decorate our homes for Easter, so why not prepare for the great feast by using veils? (From aleteia.org).
